Understanding their perspectives, methodologies, risk-assessment tools, policies, and concerns, will help us to better advocate for our client's release.

How do I address race in a client-centered effective way? How can I use statistics about race to show the disparate impact on my client? What should I look for in the Pretrial Report or in the USAO/court's arguments that are proxies for race and poverty? What's the proper district court to review a federal magistrate judge's detention or release order — the district court in the district of arrest or the district court in the charging district? This diverse panel will discuss issues of race, ethnicity, and gender and answer common nuts and bolts questions, including out-of-district issues (stays, detention despite release), challenging mandatory detention after the change of plea hearing; challenging the government's use of proffer at the hearing or a witness that knows nothing about the case; investigation of sureties; sourcing bail resources; and crimes of violence.
